Detail: While “all Christian theology is a series of footnotes to St. Paul” (S.E. Ahlstrom), some individual Christians give him a mixed review. Even Peter, writing of “our beloved brother Paul” stated that in his letters, “there are some things hard to understand” (2Peter 3:16).

In this three-part series we will unravel some of Paul's story by reflecting upon his struggles in growing as a disciple of the Risen Lord. Focus will be given to the role that his friends, especially women, played in Paul's faith journey from strict Pharisee to global citizen. Prayerfully, as we ponder “the wisdom given him” (2Peter 3:15), we will make connections with our own pilgrim lives.
